I have sat for some time now trying to figure out what to speak about in this addition of the Trinity Newsletter. To be completely honest, I have found myself wondering about this very thing at times as well. There have been many sleepless nights, many moments of worry and concern... But I was recently reminded about one very important point: Within the moments of worry, the moments of unease and uncertainty, this one thought keeps coming to me, that we are a part of God's great family, a family united in Christ Jesus our Lord, who is in and over all things. It is a wonderful and wondrous promise given – "For those who hope in the Lord" – other translations say, "for those who wait upon the Lord", "for those who trust in the Lord" – will renew their strength."

Indeed, we are trusting in the Lord, we are waiting upon Him, and in Him, in Christ our Lord, and in the Holy Spirit, is our hope. So I leave you with this assurance, from Colossians 1:15-17, "The Son is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For in Him all things were created, things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities. All things were created through Him and for Him. He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together."



We invite you to a prayer group who will meet at 9:20 on Sunday mornings, before the worship service, in the "Mother's Room" to pray especially, but not exclusively, for this period of transition at Trinity. If you are unable to attend, please join the group in prayer wherever you are!

Trinity Community Garden

Since Lincon first joined our community the young adults have aspired to develop and manage an outreach project that is a little closer to home than Charisma.

Last year I came across a small movement called Food is Free which encourages the use of vacant land for growing a garden that is managed and maintaned by members of the surrounding community. The intention of this is to provide an opportunity for people in the community - who wish to partake - to get outside, get involved, enjoy nature and learn something new with the resulting produce then being given away freely to anyone who needs or can use it.


How exciting such a concept sounded! Lincon and I both enjoy gardening, and this seemed like such a wonderful and innovative means of... well, accomplishing all sorts of things. The story of mankind begins in a garden, and tending a garden was among the first things God ever told mankind to do (GENESIS 2:15). And in the ways of plants growing from seed to fruit we can catch so many glimpses of the wonderful complexity of God's creation. I could go on about many potential benefits of such a project, but I will spare you the waffle and get to the most obvious highlight: Of course, ultimately, the harvest from these plants could be given away to people in need.

It might sound a little idealistic, but all things start small - from a seed, if you will. The best way to learn something is by doing it, and so we have planted a seed. Now we tend it, and watch and wait to see what God may grow it into.

Trust has kindly allowed us to make use of the area behind the Chapel as the starting point for this project. In Decmeber Lincon and I went in and cleaned up the area, tilled the soil and fertilised it. In January we planted the following:



- Tomatoes
- Cabbage
- Cauliflower
- Lettuce
- Maize
- Pumpkins
- Broccoli
- Spinach



And so far it seems to be going well - we even have two little tomato fruit already ripening on the stalk! As you can see, there are a few images of the little garden attached below, but most very small, because I would encourage that you go take a peek at the real thing for yourself and see how it's doing.
