
Pastoral Assistant's Letter

I cannot believe that it has been over five months since a state of disaster was declared by our president and the country placed on lockdown. For so many this has been five months of immense struggle emotionally, spiritually, physically, financially. Having never been faced with anything quite like this particular situation, having never been challenged by such a threat, at least not within our life-time, our country as well as the entire global population was forced into making changes that challenged the very fibre of our existence, changes that at times hurt, changes that forced us into moments of complete isolation and loneliness. They were changes that I believe many struggled to accept and of course adapt to, and yet, we continue to see changes happening all around us.

And I believe that at no point is this more evident and more encouraging than with the season of Spring. It is always such a wondrous moment within creation, to witness new birth, to witness how what looks to be the end, somehow spring back to life. When the grips of Winter has achieved what it sets out to achieve according its plan and purpose **as the Lord commands**, Spring is ushered in and in almost an instant, it begins to work on achieving its plan and purpose **as the Lord commands**. For we can never underestimate or overlook the hand of the Lord within His creation. This same understanding is what I hope we can all hold onto within the circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.

Yes, these changes have been a massive disruption in our lives, yes they have had devastating consequences for countless people throughout the world, yes they have resulted in untold hurt, pain, grief and mourning, but as the Psalmist reminds us in 30:5, "Weeping may last through the night, but joy comes with the morning." This is not simply an empty statement, and while it may take many months or even years before things return to 'normal', we hold onto this hope and this promise that indeed, joy will return to us. It is a hope founded upon the risen Christ, as Paul says in Romans 6:5, "For if we have been united with him in a death like his..." Peter refers to this as us sharing in His sufferings, "...we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his." We will be

united with Him in His glory as Peter tells us, we will be united with Him in His righteousness. He is our hope for a brighter tomorrow, our joy in the morning.














GARDENS AT HEARTFELT, MAKAPANSTAD








Charity Sikazwe continues to head up the Food and Nutrition Foundation in Zambia. It has been our privilege to be able to support her in this ministry from time to time.
