Dear Friends

In the early days of telegrams when they did not include punctuation in the message, a son on holiday wired his wealthy parents asking permission to purchase a very expensive item. The father wired back, "No. Expense too great." Without punctuation, the message read, "No expense too great." The son duly bought the item, much to the dismay of his parents. This silly example of mixed messages came to mind, having spent the past week at a conference devoted to an inductive study of Mark's gospel and an interpretive overview of the Old and New Testaments. Can we still believe the Bible in our contemporary world given the scathing objections of sceptics like Richard Dawkins and scholars in the academy who dismiss the Bible as an outmoded text dying the death of a thousand qualifications?

In one sense I'm tempted to agree with Charles Spurgeon, "Defend the Bible, I'd rather defend a lion. Open the cage and let it loose. The answer to every objection against the Bible is the Bible." However, we are told "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." (1Pet 3:15) Many argue that appealing to the Bible to underscore its own authority is self-defeating. To trust the Bible simply because the Bible tells us to, is a circular argument, a closed loop. However, our attitude should be that of Jesus, who considered the Scriptures as the very Word of God.

Not a few are suspicious of the truth claims of Scripture. They resort to an 'interpretation of suspicion.' Now this is appropriate in a world of fake news and when a human author has a particular slant or agenda to promote. We know from Genesis 1 and 2 that God's words are true and trustworthy. It is the serpent who lies and casts doubt. The irony is that the suspicion is misplaced. God is suspect and Satan believed. In Genesis 3 a misdirected interpretation of suspicion deceives Adam and Eve, and all who follow their example.

Tim Keller in The Reason for God poses the question, "Now what happens if you eliminate anything from the Bible that offends your sense and sensibility and crosses your will? ... Only if your God can say things that outrage you and make you struggle (as in a real friendship or marriage!) will you know that you have got hold of a real God and not a figment of your imagination. So an authoritative Bible is not the enemy of a personal relationship with God. It is the precondition for it."

We stay in Scripture not simply to prove that it is true and trustworthy but to show that the Holy Spirit who inspired the words of the Bible, indwells us and shapes our lives to become more Christlike and fruitful. As ever with warm affection.

- 2. Is there something that we can still learn from them. Please do join us that as we journey together through this series.



SUBJECT: THANK YOU AND NEWS FROM DALE AND KAREN

Dear Alan and All at Trinity,

Thank you very, very much for your support! We are full of praise to our Lord for His provision through you!

These past two months after returning from a full but God-blessed seven weeks in California and Arizona have been difficult ones for us. Ministry-wise we are seeing God continue to work in very meaningful and amazing ways but we got back into the "thick of things" too fast so have not had enough opportunity for rest and have not fully returned to our previous good routines. Even more than this, we have been much in prayer for, and then affected and saddened by the death of two of our OMF Japan colleagues.

Last week our Field Director, David Ferguson, died after a year battling two rare blood cancers. The same week saw a Japanese worker (on home assignment) go to heaven. Their funerals were on the same day (in different places) and I (Dale) led David's Internet-feed funeral in Sapporo. (Unfortunately the first 35 minutes of the feed was nonexistent so I read and led from a Japanese draft I had received until we could link-up.) Three people I worked with when leading the church plant ion Otaru are now in heaven! (Maude almost 10 years ago, How Chuang Chua two years ago and now David last week.)

This week we submitted nominations for a replacement Field Director. Please pray for this because any appointment will affect the different ministries in Japan, and, depending on who is chosen, our relationship with the Japanese pastors and churches with whom we collaborate.

We are grateful for another baptism at Central Church on Easter Sunday (when 65 people came to the service!), and for our good support, fellowship and relationship with Pastor Ozawa and his wife. (We had lunch together this week.) I will preach at Central Church on Sunday and once a month for the next few months.

Karen is busy organizing short-term workers coming to Hokkaido for the summer. We, ourselves, will join two prayer teams — one to North East Hokkaido with a Dutch couple who were part of a team three years ago, and another to North West Hokkaido with four younger people from the UK. It is exciting to see how the arrangements for these teams are falling into place!

My eldest son, Stephen and his girlfriend, will visit Hokkaido for three weeks in June (and will renew his re-entry permit so that he can continue to have Japanese Permanent Residence status).

Karen and I are reading together each morning Paula Gooder's book "This Risen Experience: The Spirit of Easter." It is good to have a book that emphasizes the resurrection of Jesus — taking us from the resurrection through to Pentecost. (There are any number of books for Lent...)

It is four and a half years since I had an operation for melanoma and my skin doctor has (finally!) given me the "all-clear" so I can stop the regular CT scans.

We pray for you as well and can remember with joy the time we spent with you.
